We discussed the costs of supplying printed copies of the Vintage Viewpoint for members who have requested this.

The cost of printing is on average is \$30 per year, and postage on top of that is \$35 per year.

This is a cost to the Branch of around \$2600, a benefit to those members which most members do not receive.

The Branch receives \$35 from your subscription amount each year from the National Office. This is the fund which allows us to continue to offer the service we do to all members.

I have sent an email to all those members who have email, that if you want to continue to receive a hard copy, you will need to pay for the privilege.

If you wish to still receive the Vintage Viewpoint as a printed copy, please reply to me on the branch email as soon as you can so we can make provision to charge you for this service. We will begin this service in January 2026.

If I do not hear from you, you will not get a printed copy after December but will continue to get it by email, which you can print off for yourself if you require.

On most printers there is an option to print in booklet form which I have done and looks good.

The cost as set out above for printed copies will be \$30 per year, and for those who are posted the cost will be \$65 per year, payable in advance.

There are some 12 members who do not have email and will continue to receive a printed copy.

A copy will be retained at the clubrooms for people to read but will not be removed.

We have decided to cancel the Clubrooms phone, as often it does not work, and most people now have a cell phone. This will be a saving of \$50 per month.

THE TIMES THEY ARE CHANGING

Apologies to Bob Dylan for using the title of one of the big hit songs he wrote and sung but the title is appropriate for our branch.

Last month's grapevine touched on the Nelson safaris which were an annual branch event. Unless you are 55 years plus member you would not have participated on a safari. Even 55 years ago the safaris had changed. On the first safaris, many of the cars which motored over S.H. 6 to Nelson, were Veterans. Today members travelling to Nelson for a VCC event drive vehicles from the vintage class to the 30 years old class.

Likewise, our members have changed. The majority of the early members who drove to events in Nelson were aged from their late twenties to their late fifties. Quite a few children were present. Some of the children had no appreciation of vintage motoring and got bored and started fighting in the back seats. Worse some of them got car sick on the back seats.

A majority of those early members who travelled to Nelson events on S.H. 6 have since travelled on the highway, which leads to the pearly gates and where now are the cars which were seen regularly on those events? Very few are still owned within the branch. The obvious one is foundation member Ted Lucas's 1914 Model T Ford which Ted gifted to the branch and is on permanent display in our museum.

There have been suggestions that the T was originally owned by Frank Southgate who owned an early grocery shop in High Street, but the Southgate ownership has never been proven. It is known the T found its way to the Peake farm at Onamalutu where it was eventually dismantled. Most of the parts were gathered up by John Reid who was employed as a salesman by Lucas Bros garage and service station. John got the restoration of the car well under way but unfortunately lost his life in a railway level crossing accident.

The restoration was taken over by Ted Lucas who was John Reids brother-in-law. The 1928 Ford Model A, which is also on display in our museum, was purchased by Ted in 1958 shortly after the branch was formed. The A is now owned by Lucas family members living out of Marlborough so we can no longer claim it as a branch vehicle.

Along with the Ford T the only other vehicle in the branch I can think of as being owned by a foundation member is Graham and Carol Wiblin's 1928 Renault Vivo six. Foundation member Bruce Mantold located the Renault parked up in a side street on the north side of town. He is not sure how many previous owners it had had. The branch 1959 newsletter reported "Bruce has just about completed the Renault" and the October 1960 newsletter reported it was motoring. Bruce later resigned to pursue other interests and Renault, needing some repairs, was parked up again. Graham and Carol purchased it in the mid to late 1970's and gave it another extensive restoration. It has since participated in possibly more branch outings and rallies as well as rallies around N.Z. than any other branch vehicle. There would be very few state highways in N.Z. Graham and Carol have not viewed through the windscreen of their Renault.


